# Quibbletown Continues Popular Comic Book Style SEL Campaign

Quibbletown Social Emotional Learning (SEL) Day focused on self-reflection. The Quib Health and Wellness club supported these efforts by first creating a flyer illustrated by Eighth Grader Marcus Pinto, highlighting key aspects of SEL: self-awareness; self-management; social awareness; relationship skills; and responsible decision-making. The students shared the flyer with all grade levels on Schoology, along with a two-question poll: 1) Which domain (or part) of SEL are you very good at? Choices: Self-Awareness, Self-Management, Social Awareness, Relationship Skills, Responsible Decision- Making. 2) Which domain (or part) of SEL do you want to improve in? Choices: Self-Awareness, Self-Management, Social Awareness, Relationship Skills, Responsible Decision-Making. The answers will drive the direction of the club and affect how it will support SEL initiatives. In collaboration with overall school initiatives: mentoring, counseling lessons, and self—regulation education, the club supports the process through which students acquire and apply the knowledge, skills and attitudes to develop healthy identities, manage emotions, and achieve personal goals.

Arbor students celebrated New Jersey's first Social and Emotional Learning (SEL) Day on Friday, March 26, reflecting on and sharing their thoughts about the importance of discussing feelings, showing empathy, and developing positive relationships with classmates and teachers. Leading up to SEL Day, students participated in Zones of Regulation counseling lessons, framework that offers tools and strategies to help them recognize and regulate their feelings. By embracing social and emotional education, students build communication and problem-solving skills, and see academic and interpersonal benefits. This nationwide contest logs the reading hours students spend in their digital audiobook library, accessed through Learning Ally, an educational reading app designed for students who learn best through listening. The digital library includes textbooks from kindergarten through post-graduate as well as classic literature and high interest, new titles. Audio books are particularly helpful for students with certain learning disabilities or visual impairments. Special Education Reading Teacher Michelle Jacobs entered PHS students as a motivating tool and the students responded by reading a total of 19,658 pages during the five-week contest period. The students were awarded a \$150 Visa gift card for PHS. Congratulations PHS readers!

# PBL Assay Science Offers Opportunities to PHS Biomedical Students

PBL Assay Science is a Piscataway company offering biomedical products and services. WHEREAS the proposed development is opposed by many members of our community, including the Piscataway Township Education Association; and

WHEREAS we believe that it is a proper role of the Board of Education to express its opinion on matters directly affecting our children and school community;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Piscataway Township Board of Education expresses its opposition to the rezoning of the property at 1690 South Washington Avenue; and

FURTHER BE IT RESOLVED that the Piscataway Township Board of Education directs the Board Secretary to transmit official copies of this resolution to the Piscataway Township Council, the Piscataway Township Zoning Board, the Piscataway Township Planning Board, Piscataway Mayor Brian Wahler, and the Commissioner of the NJ Department of Environmental Protection.

# ADDENDUM TO THE TRANSPORTATION SERVICES AGREEMENTS BETWEEN

# THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE TOWNSHIP OF PISCATAWAY AND

# LAYLA TRANSPORTATION AND TRADING, INC.

WHEREAS, the Board of Education of the Township of Piscataway (the "Board") and Layla Transportation and Trading, Inc. ("the Contractor") are parties to Transportation Services Agreements for the 2020-2021 school year ("Agreements"); and

WHEREAS, the Board is responsible for the transportation of students residing within the Township of Piscataway Public School District; and

WHEREAS, the Board entered into Agreements with the Contractor for transportation services, which provides that the Contractor shall be paid only for transportation services performed; and

WHEREAS, due to COVID-19, the Township of Piscataway Public School District has been closed as of March 17, 2020; and

WHEREAS, as a result, the Contractor's transportation services have since discontinued; and

WHEREAS, to ensure that transportation services will be available when schools reopen, the Board agrees to continue payment in accordance with the terms and conditions set forth herein; and

WHEREAS, on April 14, 2020, Governor Philip D. Murphy signed into law P.L. 2020, c. 27, which includes a provision for payments to contracted service providers during the current public health emergency; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the above-referenced law, the Board is to make payments for "benefits, compensation, and emoluments" and is not to pay for service provider's indirect costs such as fuel and tolls; and

WHEREAS, the Contractor is obligated to use renegotiated payments to meet its payroll and fixed cost obligations;

WHEREAS, by this Addendum, the Board will have fulfilled its obligations pursuant to law P.L. 2020, c. 27; and

WHEREAS, the Agreements terminate on 6/30/2021 and the Board will no longer be subject to the obligations imposed by P.L. 2020, c. 27 in regards to the Contractor; and

WHEREAS, N.J.S.A. 18A:19-3 requires that demands for compensation under the Agreements must be accompanied by an affidavit verifying that compensation is limited to services rendered; and

WHEREAS, in order to ensure operations/service continuity following the end of the Closure Period and to provide for transportation services when in-person instruction resumes; and

WHEREAS, the parties are desirous of amending the terms of the Agreements to memorialize and clarify the respective responsibilities and obligations of the parties as set forth above.

# NOW, WHEREFORE, THE PARTIES AGREE as follows:

- 1. The Agreements are hereby amended as follows:
  - A. During the period from February 1, 2021 through February 28, 2021 that the Township of Piscataway Public School District remains closed without the need for transportation services as a result of COVID-19, the Agreements shall remain in full force and effect and the Board shall continue its payment obligations, but at the reduced rate of sixty percent (60%) of the estimated total cost per route(s), as identified in the Agreements.
    - i. The parties acknowledge that the reduction in rate is solely for the period of school closure as a result of COVID-19 as the Contractor is not incurring certain operational costs, such as, but not limited to, those related to fuel and vehicle maintenance.
  - B. The Contractor hereby certifies that Contractor does not have business interruption insurance or similar insurance policy.
- 2. All other terms and conditions of the Agreements not addressed herein shall remain in full force and effect.
- 3. This Addendum is contingent upon approval by the Board of Education of the Township of Piscataway.
